The Witness Stones Project

The Witness Stones ProjectTM is an educational initiative whose mission is to restore the history and honor the humanity of the enslaved individuals who helped build our communities.

The Project provides local archival research, professional teacher development, a classroom curriculum, and public programming to help students discover and chronicle the local history of slavery. The final component of the work in each community is the placement of Witness Stone MemorialsTM that honor enslaved individuals where they lived, worked, or worshiped.


Inspired by the Stolpersteine project in Germany, the Project began in Guilford, Connecticut, in 2017. In five years, the Project has partnered with 94 schools and civic organizations in 50 communities across 5 states. More than 6,600 middle and high school students and their communities have participated in the Project.



Known Timeline of Cato Cuff's Life

Overview: Michaela Miner

At 10 years old Cato was taken aboard a slave ship and was brought to Boston, Massachusetts. He was bought by Elihu Chesebrough. When Elihu Chesebrough passed Cato was given to Naboth Chesebrough, Elihu's son. Naboth made Cato help with the cider mill and many other things. On April 29th, 1777 Cato was enlisted into the military for a term of 3 years. He fought in two battles. The battle of Monmouth and Germantown. After he served his 3 years he was discharged in New Jersey. In 1818, 38 years after he was discharged he applied for a pension. He supported evidence that he served and started receiving \$8 a month. 2 years later he married Flora Palmer, now Flora Chesebrough. Cato and Flora lived in a house that was owned by Thomas Palmer and his late wife. The house was on Pequot Trail, Stonington CT

and they lived here until they passed.































First Congregational Church of Stonington ~The Road Church~



Cato Cuff married Flora Palmer at The Road Church

The First Congregational Church of Stonington is the oldest church in Stonington (The Road Church) and one of the oldest in Connecticut. The church was established in 1674 and the first Minister was Reverend James Noyes. The current Road Church Meetinghouse was built in 1829 after the original building burned. Many of the beams and other significant architectural features that were salvaged after the fire, were used when constructing the Sanctuary seen today. The church has a unique design and all attempts were made to keep it as original as possible. The box style pews and the simplicity of the church architecture date back to the late 17th century. In 2024, the First Congregational Church of Stonington will celebrate its 350th anniversary!

Nekita Waller from Middletown, Connecticut was Connecticut's 17th State Troubadour. Nekita's diverse musical journey has taken her through chorus groups, musical theater, Hartt School of Music, and mentoring and performing with many independent artists. Nekita has shared the stage with

She has performed on the Steve Harvey Radio Show and has been heard on more than 60 radio stations and by approximately six million weekly listeners. "Music is my purest form of communication.
